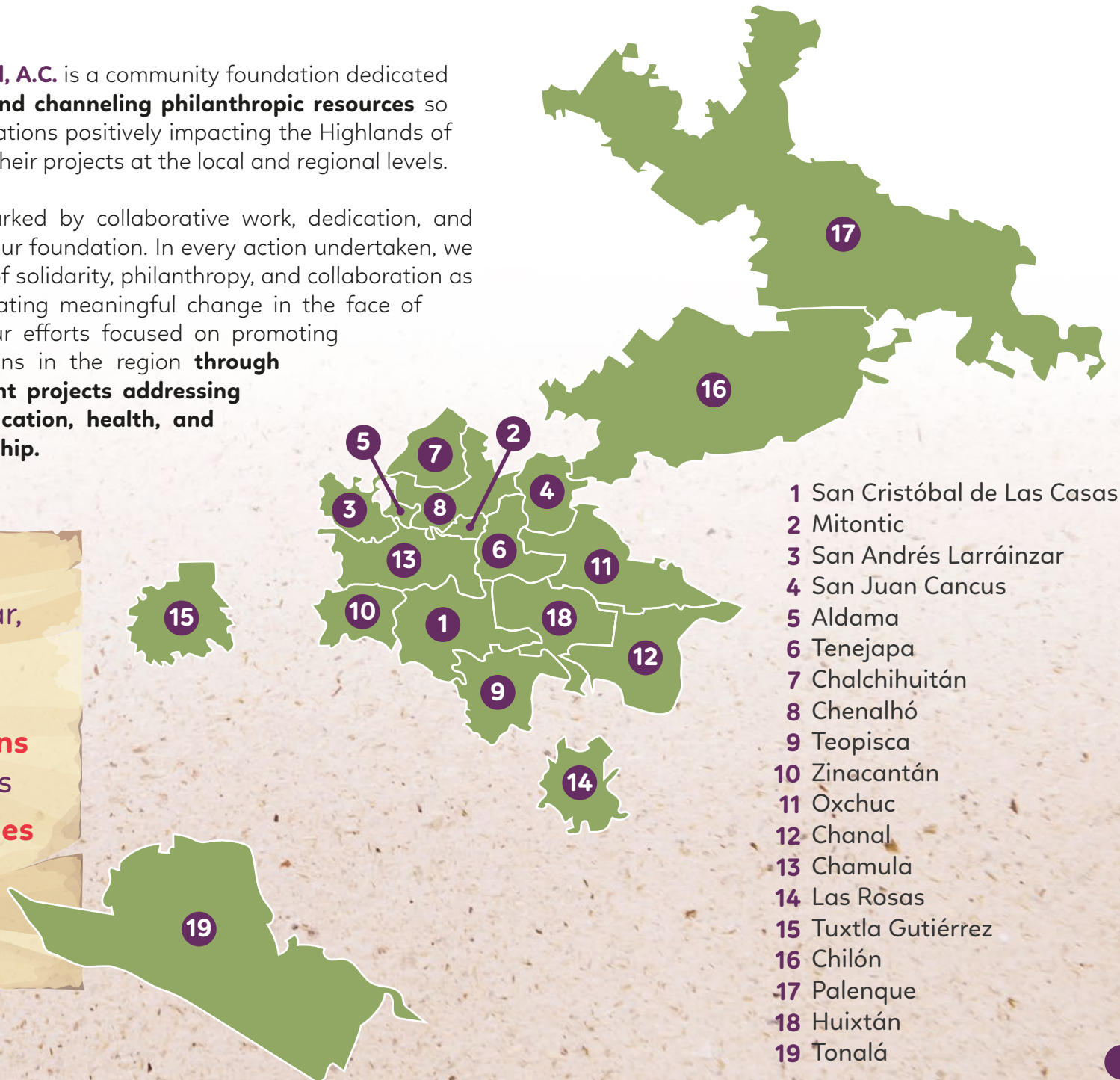

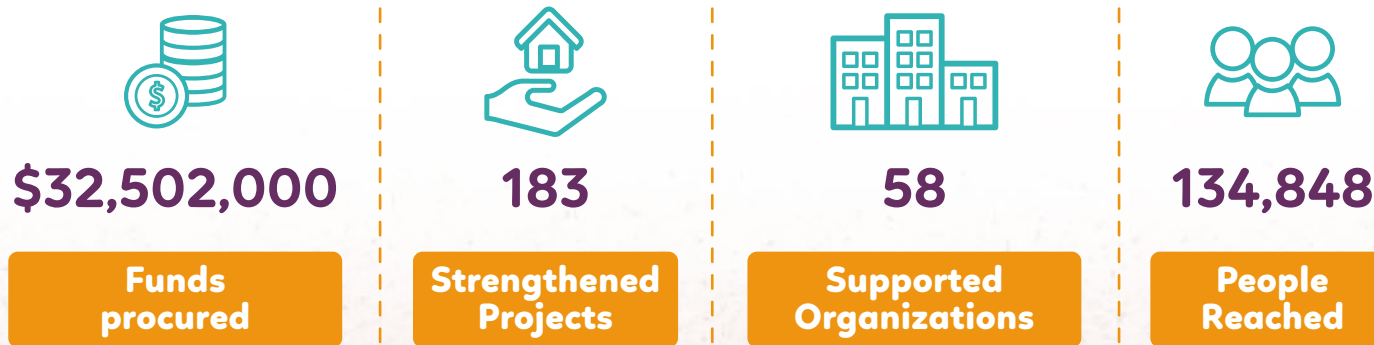

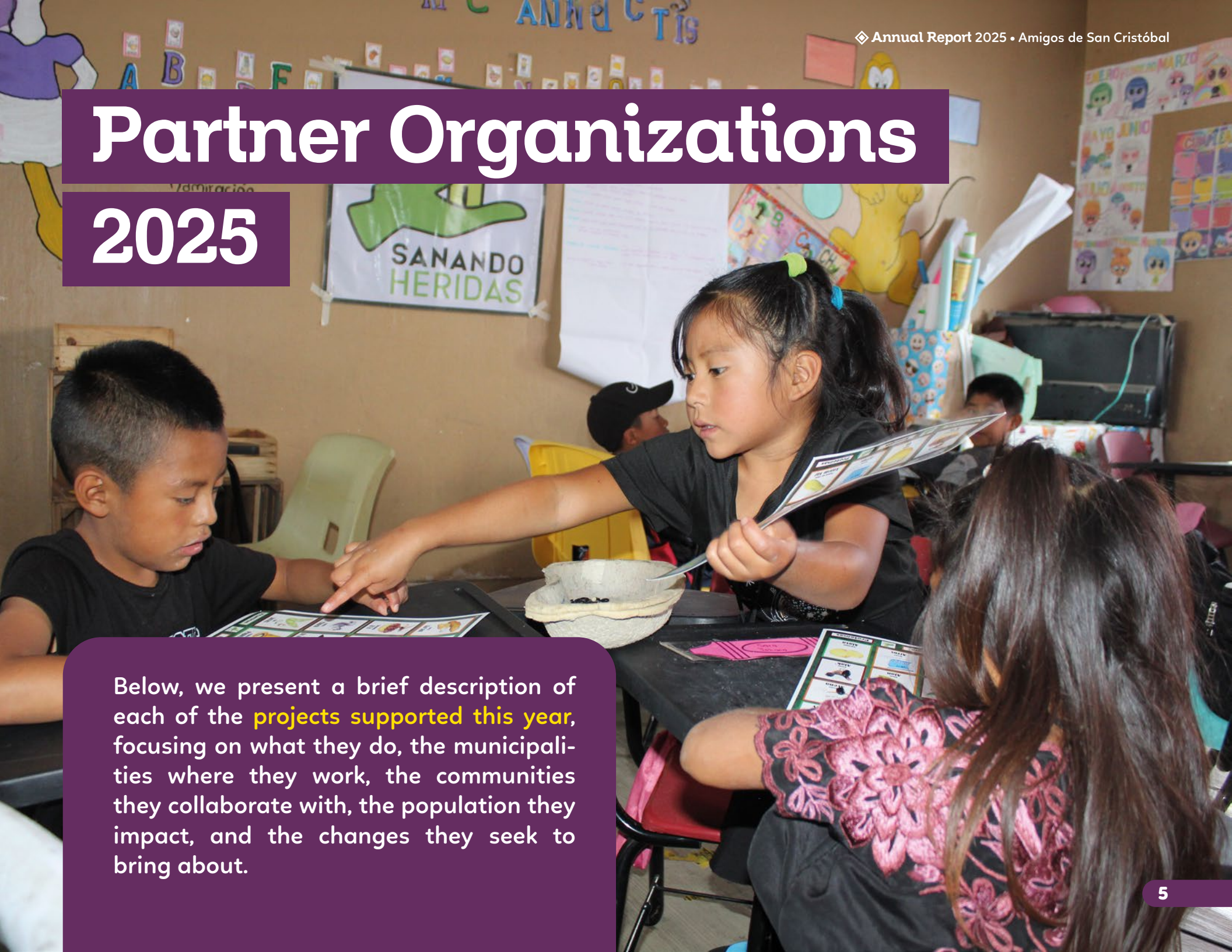


Over these years, the projects we have supported have had a direct and indirect impact on **12 of the 17 SDGs** (Sustainable Development Goals).

Below, we present a brief description of each of the **projects supported this year**, focusing on what they do, the municipalities where they work, the communities they collaborate with, the population they impact, and the changes they seek to bring about.

1 Tierra Roja Cuxtitali, A.C.

Project: “Tierra Roja Cuxtitali: 10 Years of Peace and Community Learning”

Location: San Cristóbal de Las Casas

Beneficiaries: 70 direct beneficiaries / Between 275 and 530 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** A community-based educational project grounded in popular education and peace education, aimed at children, youth, and families in the Cuxtitali neighborhood. The project works through four main areas: comprehensive education, socio-emotional development, socio-environmental awareness, and community participation. It promotes equitable relationships, reflection on gender and violence, and the strengthening of the social fabric through educational processes, public events, and volunteer engagement.



2 Hogar Comunitario, Yach'il Antzetic, A.C.

Project: “New Women: Comprehensive Development Free from Violence”

Location: San Cristóbal de Las Casas, Mitontic, Aldama, San Andrés Larráinzar, Tenejapa, and San Juan Cancuc.

Beneficiaries: 737 direct beneficiaries; 630 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** Comprehensive support for Indigenous and mestizo women, girls, boys, and adolescents, with an emphasis on the prevention of violence and early pregnancies. The project combines emotional and prenatal care, organizational strengthening, self-employment and economic autonomy initiatives (TRAMA group), and coordination with other community actors, promoting lives free from violence and with greater autonomy.



3 Melel Xojobal, A.C.

Project: “Leading Participation for Contextualized Education as a Right”

Location: San Cristóbal de Las Casas.

Beneficiaries: 145 direct beneficiaries; 580 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** Strengthens the right to education for working children in markets and public squares in San Cristóbal. The project provides safe learning spaces with contextualized literacy, life skills development, emotional management, and peaceful conflict resolution. At the same time, it carries out awareness-raising activities with families and the community to prevent school dropout and promote the dignity of working children.



4 Sanando Heridas, A.C.

Project: “Strengthening Oral Health in Tsotsil Communities”

Location: Chalchihuitán, Chenalhó, San Cristóbal, Teopisca, and Zinacantán.

Beneficiaries: 1,030 direct beneficiaries; 2,495 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** Provides medical and dental care to low-income families in rural communities of the Highlands of Chiapas. The project combines health services (medical consultations, dental care, and follow-up care for pregnant women and children) with preventive education in schools on healthy nutrition and oral health, prioritizing children and women.



5 IDEAS – CH’IELTIK, A.C.

Project: “Socio-Emotional Education for School Retention”

Location: Chenalhó and San Juan Cancuc.

Beneficiaries: 195 direct beneficiaries; 716 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** Works with Maya children, adolescents, and youth to strengthen socio-emotional skills, emotional management, and the prevention of discrimination. Through participatory workshops in schools, the project promotes respectful relationships, school retention, and safe spaces, while recognizing gender differences in emotional expression.



6 CONIDER, A.C.

Project: “Misma Luna” (“Same Moon”)

Location: San Cristóbal de Las Casas, Oxchuc, Tenejapa, Chanal, Chamula, Las Rosas, and San Juan Cancuc.

Beneficiaries: 194 direct beneficiaries; 238 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** A dignified menstrual education program for middle school adolescents in San Juan Cancuc. The project provides information in the Tseltal language, distributes sanitary kits, and conducts awareness-raising activities with students and teachers. Its goal is to break taboos, promote menstrual health, and strengthen the dignity and self-care of adolescent girls in Indigenous communities.



7 Formación y Capacitación, A.C. (FOCA)

Project: “Visibility and Strengthening of Midwives and Apprentices”

Location: San Cristóbal de Las Casas, Oxchuc, Tenejapa, Chanal, Chamula, Las Rosas, and San Juan Cancuc.

Beneficiaries: 30 direct beneficiaries; 35 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** Strengthens traditional midwifery through intergenerational dialogue between master midwives and apprentices. The project integrates ancestral knowledge with tools related to comprehensive health, leadership, and rights, using an intercultural and gender-sensitive approach. Its aim is to ensure the continuity of traditional midwifery and the recognition of its role in community health.



8 Foro para el Desarrollo Sustentable, A.C. (Semillero 259 y Patrulla Roja)

Project: “Agroecological Community for Buen Vivir (Good Living)”

Location: San Cristóbal de Las Casas.

Beneficiaries: 123 direct beneficiaries; 3,800 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** Promotes community-based processes with children and youth in peri-urban areas, combining agroecology, art, sports, and culture. The project encourages mindful nutrition, self-care, physical activity, and connection with the land, while recovering ancestral knowledge and strengthening community identity.



9 Agua y Vida: Mujeres, Derechos y Ambiente, A.C.

Project: “Strengthening Women in Participatory Water Management – Phase 2”

Location: San Cristóbal de Las Casas, Tuxtla, Chenalhó, Tenejapa, Chilón, Palenque, and Tonalá.

Beneficiaries: 30 direct beneficiaries; 330 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** An ecofeminist project that strengthens the leadership of women water defenders in San Cristóbal de Las Casas. It includes municipal and regional gatherings, audiovisual production, and advocacy actions to highlight the role of women in the protection of wetlands and the promotion of equitable access to water.



10 Promedios de Comunicación Comunitaria, A.C.

Project: “The Hearth of Words: Community Stories Laboratory”

Location: San Cristóbal de Las Casas and Tenejapa.

Beneficiaries: 147 direct beneficiaries; 3,500 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** A popular communication and community arts project that strengthens local narratives through radio, recording, and story editing. It promotes cultural identity, a culture of peace, territorial defense, and women’s participation by organizing community and university gatherings to build networks and amplify local voices.



11 Jóvenes Articulando Territorios, A.C. (JOVENARTE)

Project: “Agroecological Youth for Buen Vivir (Good Living) in Huixtán”

Location: Huixtán.

Beneficiaries: 82 direct beneficiaries; 465 indirect beneficiaries.

- **Main focus:** Strengthens youth participation through school gardens, agroecology, and climate action. The project includes productive infrastructure, training for youth and teachers, the development of a Local Action Plan for climate risks, and community reforestation, connecting schools, families, and local authorities.

Monitoring and support of funded projects

MID-YEAR AND END-OF-YEAR MONITORING VISITS

Throughout 2025, **Amigos de San Cristóbal** conducted follow-up visits to funded organizations with the objective of gaining first-hand knowledge of the progress, challenges, and impacts of each project. A total of 22 visits were carried out during the year, in June and November, along with their corresponding reports and feedback sessions. These visits made it possible to **strengthen relationships** with community teams, observe field activities, engage in **dialogue with beneficiaries**, and **provide technical feedback to improve project processes and sustainability**.



TECHNICAL AND ORGANIZATIONAL SUPPORT

In addition to monitoring activities, the foundation provided ongoing support to organizations in administrative, narrative, and financial matters, strengthening their internal capacities and promoting more solid, transparent management aligned with their community goals.

- On May 23 and 30, workshops were held to share the findings of the research study: **“A Comprehensive Encounter with Philanthropy through Collaborative Experiences with Amigos de San Cristóbal.”** Organizations and collectives had the opportunity to share the ways they collaborate with one another, as well as how they experience philanthropy within their living spaces, work, and social commitment.





Funding management and project calls for proposals

SIGNING OF AGREEMENTS WITH ORGANIZATIONS

In February, agreements were **signed with the selected organizations**. Beyond being a formal procedure, this gathering created opportunities for exchange among organizations, project presentations, and the identification of potential collaborations, thereby strengthening the community network.

The total amount granted to the 11 organizations was MXN \$1,640,000 pesos.



2026 FUNDING CALL FOR PROPOSALS

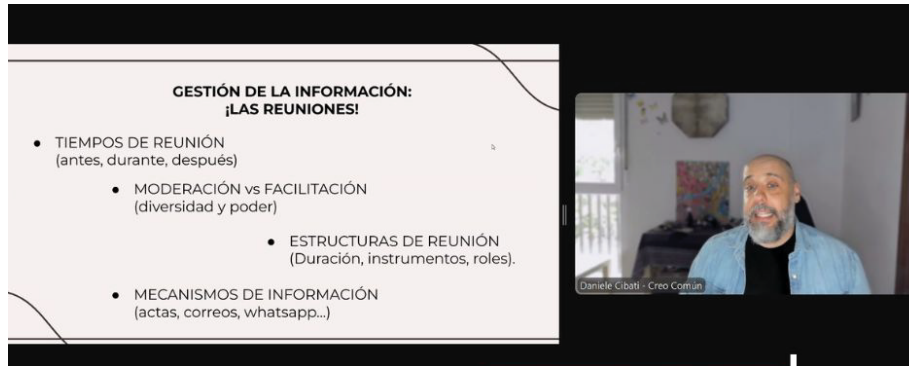
In August, **the call for 2026 projects** was published, launching a new process of legal, fiscal, and technical review. This effort made it possible to broaden the foundation's reach and connect with new community initiatives in the Highlands of Chiapas.



Institutional strengthening and capacity building

TRAINING WITH CEMEFI (MEXICAN CENTER FOR PHILANTHROPY)

The operational team participated in **workshops on creativity for social causes and constructive conflict management in social organizations**, strengthening skills in communication, collaborative work, and the resolution of internal tensions.



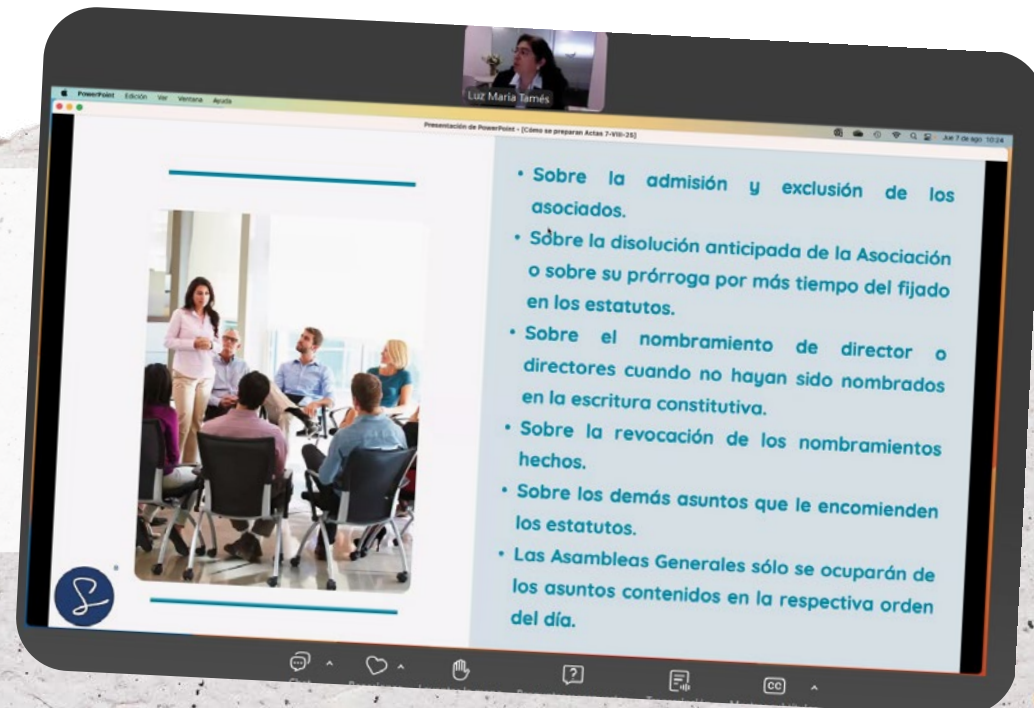
WORKSHOPS WITH REDECIM (MEXICAN INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION NETWORK)

Throughout the year, the team participated in various workshops organized by the Mexican International Cooperation Network, focused on project design and evaluation, gender and human rights approaches, sustainability and inclusion, as well as access to international funding opportunities. These trainings strengthened the foundation's strategic planning and international outreach.



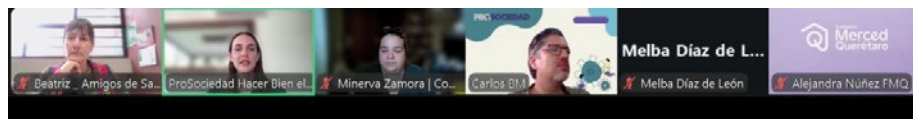
LEGAL TRAINING WITH APPLESEED MÉXICO

The team participated in a **specialized workshop on the proper drafting of assembly meeting minutes for civil society organizations**, strengthening legal compliance and institutional governance.



ESG INDICATORS AND SUSTAINABILITY

Amigos de San Cristóbal began a training process on **Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) indicators** through the **Impacta+ Program**, working with the Sustainability Financial Reporting Standards (NIS), with the aim of improving sustainability, impact measurement, communication, and accountability regarding social impact.

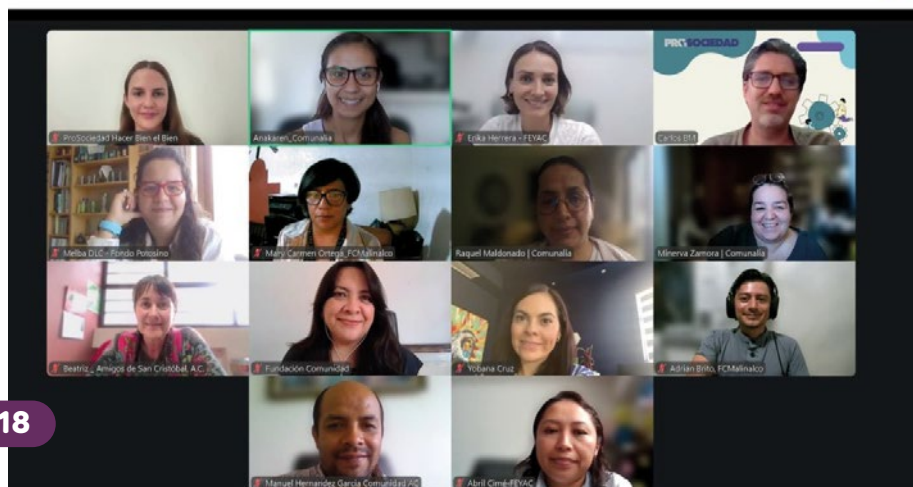

LEADERSHIP FOR SOCIAL CHANGE CONGRESS

At the beginning of September, the foundation's leadership participated in a **national conference in Querétaro aimed at NGO leaders**, focused on transformational leadership and the strengthening of management capacities and strategic vision. It was a space for reflection and learning, where we were able to network with community foundations and companies, and gain additional strategies to strengthen our work.

RELATIONSHIPS WITH NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL FUNDERS

During 2025, the foundation hosted and accompanied visits from representatives of partner foundations such as **Daniele Agostino Derossi** (Armando Alfonzo), **Hahn Air Foundation** (Nico Gormsen), and **Maya Educational Foundation** (Amy Holly and Norma Subuyuj). These visits provided an opportunity to showcase the impact of the supported projects and strengthen long-term relationships built on trust.



LINKAGES WITH STUDENTS AND UNIVERSITIES

Connections were facilitated between students from **Centro de Estudios La Salle and Indiana University** and local organizations, promoting volunteering, knowledge exchange, and awareness of the social reality in Chiapas.



PARTICIPATION IN COMUNALIA

Amigos de San Cristóbal actively participated in meetings, assemblies, and learning spaces organized by Comunalia, the Mexican Alliance of Community Foundations, contributing to the exchange of experiences, the strengthening of the sector, and the development of a more robust community philanthropy field. Highlights include:

- 2025 Ordinary General **Assembly** of the Comunalia Board of Directors (virtual meeting).
- **Forum:** Community Foundations – Alliance for the Future of Migration (held in February in Mexico City).
- 2025 Community Foundations **Meeting** and Comunalia Annual Assembly (held in November in Mexico City).



LINKAGE WITH THE SAN CRISTÓBAL SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA AND CHOIR

Throughout the year, **two concerts** (in April and October) and other orchestra performances were supported, **highlighting the impact of music as a tool for social transformation for children and youth.** In addition, four students from San Cristóbal, from the choir and instrumental sections, participated in the First National Esperanza Azteca Orchestra Meeting, held in Aguascalientes.



OTHER NETWORKING ACTIVITIES

Amigos de San Cristóbal also took part in activities such as:

- **15th Anniversary of Ch'ieltik, A.C.**
- **Health Fair** (organized by Melel Xojobal, A.C. in collaboration with Médecins du Monde Switzerland in Mexico, Sanando Heridas A.C., and allied private physicians).





Institutional and commemorative events

20TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

In 2025, the foundation celebrated 20 years of community work in the Highlands of Chiapas. As part of this commemoration, spaces for reflection and visibility were organized to highlight the impact achieved over two decades of supporting local organizations.



FORUM “AMIGOS DE SAN CRISTÓBAL: 20 YEARS OF IMPACT IN THE REGION”

In August, a forum was held with partner organizations, academics, and community members, where learnings, experiences, and reflections were shared on community philanthropy and the collective impact generated over these two decades in the region.

A panel of specialists participated, including Pablo Farías, board member, who spoke about the philanthropic context in Mexico and Chiapas; Alma Rosa Rojas from CEPAZDH; and Sandra Lorea from Hogar Comunitario Yach’il Antsetic, representatives of organizations supported by Amigos, who shared success stories from their communities; and Jesús Carmona from ECOSUR, who highlighted the importance of linking academia and the social sector. The gathering also included a group work session.

Using a timeline, participants were able to revisit the most significant milestones of these 20 years of community work. We were also very pleased to have the presence of two of the association’s founders: Nancy and David Orr.





Communication, outreach and visibility

PUBLICATION OF 4 QUARTERLY NEWSLETTERS AND THE 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

Four informational newsletters were produced and disseminated (March, June, September, and December), sharing project updates, institutional activities, testimonials, and collective achievements. The 2024 Annual Report was also distributed through different channels in digital format, in both Spanish and English (as with the newsletters).



SOCIAL MEDIA AND AWARENESS CAMPAIGNS

The foundation supported the dissemination of campaigns led by partner organizations on topics such as water defense, children's rights, youth, and community culture, expanding their reach and visibility.

LAUNCH OF THE NEW WEBSITE

In August, the new institutional website was launched, featuring a renewed structure and updated content that reflects the work, values, and impact of Amigos de San Cristóbal.

PRODUCTION OF A TESTIMONIAL VIDEO

A documentary video was produced and shared, featuring testimonials from organizations that participated in the 20th anniversary FORUM, serving as a tool for institutional memory and communication with donors and the general public.

The annual membership renewal campaign was promoted as a way to strengthen the donor community and encourage the participation of individuals and families committed to community development.

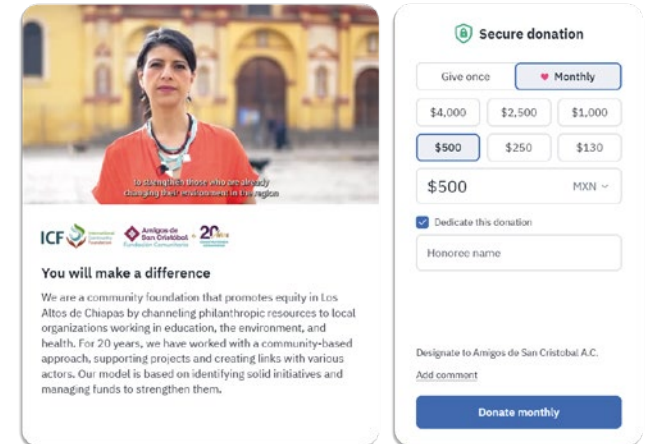
BEGINNING OF THE RELATIONSHIP WITH ICF (INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY FOUNDATION)
